Transfigurations in a Mutilated World


ve never met anyone who thought today's story in Genesis of Abraham and Isaac to be a good story. Abhorred, they ask, "Why would God test someone by asking him to sacrifice his son?" But what if we change the question and ask, "Why would the Hebrew people include that story in their most holy writings? Why would they tell it over and over?" Because of the ending-that's why. Like a movie we watch over and over even though we know how it ends, we watch it, in part, because the ending is satisfying.

The ending of the Abraham/Isaac story shows God is not interested in death and human sacrifice, contrary to the gods of that time. The God of the Hebrews is a God of Life-that's the surprise ending they love, and they keep telling it over and over lest they forget. For them, the part about the testing is simply a means to that unbelievable ending when God insists upon life, contrary to false gods.

In his poem "Try to Praise the Mutilated World," Adam Zagajewski writes of life's Godly moments in a world we have mutilated by violence, greed, division, and more. He muses on tender moments when we fall in love, on laughter until our sides hurt, on nature's dazzle, on the sweet taste of wine-all simple moments of a life-giving God transfigured in a mutilated world, for our God insists upon life. •

What Do Ashes Signify?

When God drove our first parents from the Garden, he reminded Adam, "You are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Gn 3:19). When we received the ashes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday, it was a reminder of our mortality and the seriousness of the Lenten pilgrimage we are on.

In the Old Testament ashes signified sorrow and repentance; Job repented in dust and ashes; Jesus said, "Woe to you ... if the mighty deeds done in your midst had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would long ago have repented in sackcloth and ashes" (Mt 11:21).

A Few More Tips to Make Lent More Meaningful

Slow Down – Set aside 10 minutes a day for silent prayer or meditation. It will revitalize your body and your spirit.

Read a good book – You could choose the life of a saint, a spiritual how-to, an inspirational book, or one of the pope's new books.

Be kind – Go out of your way to do something nice for someone else every day.

Get involved – Attend a Lenten lecture or spiritual program.

Volunteer at your parish – Whether it's cleaning the church or helping with the food drive, it will give you a chance to help others.

Reach out – Invite an inactive Catholic to come to Stations of the Cross, Confession or Mass with you anytime during Lent.

Pray – Especially for people you don't like and for people who don't like you.

Tune out – Turn off the television and spend quality time talking with family members or friends.

Clean out closets – Donate gently used items to the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

Did You Know?

The Archdiocese of Montreal is suing the government of Quebec over a law passed in 2023 that would force Catholic hospices to commit assisted suicide, contrary to the Fifth Commandment and Catholic teaching. Originally, Quebec law allowed hospices to refrain from offering MAID on their own premises. However, an amendment was made to the law requiring hospices to commit MAID on request. The law took effect Dec. 2, 2023 and contains no religious or conscientious objection clause.

Many Catholic hospices and health care institutions across Canada are now under attack to provide MAID on their premises. Archbishop Lepine is defending the right to refuse MAID on church properties as it violates the Canadian Charter and Quebec Charter and violates Catholic teaching.

WHAT WAS THE TRANSFIGURATION?

Following Jesus' prediction to the apostles of His Passion and stating the difficult demands of His discipleship, came the account of Jesus' Transfiguration. This clearly revealed Jesus' divinity for a moment and allowed His glory to shine forth for the encouragement of the three apostles who were present.



The Transfiguratiion was foreshadowed in the Old Testament by God's revelation of Himself to Moses on Mount Sinai. The Ignatius Catholic Study Bible (Gospel of Matthew) lists several parallels between the two epiphanies in Exodus & Matthew's Gospel:

> Each takes place on a mountain Each occurs on a 7th day Each shows forth the glory of God's presence Each reports God speaking through a cloud

Moses and Elijah are the key representatives of the Law and the Prophets. Their coming to talk with Jesus shows Him to be the fulfillment of God's revelation to them. Only St. Luke speaks of the subject of their conversation, of Jesus' "exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem."

It was important for the apostles to know that Jesus did not simply <u>endure</u> His passion; He <u>accomplished</u> it, by totally submitting Himself to it.
