To Be or Not to Be...Spiritual

ust as we may hear the voice of our mother echoing in our head long after she has passed away,

in much the same way do we who gather week after week as people of faith begin to hear the words and wisdom of the Lord Jesus. It is how he shepherds us, and how we follow him-by hearing and then living his word.

There are some who say they are not religious, but they are spiritual. Ultimately, to be spiritual is to have a core set of values by which one lives. One's core values can take many shapes. For us, who call ourselves disciples of Jesus, to be spiritual is to take on the values and wisdom of Jesus-to allow his way to take root in the core of who we are. It means living by the wisdom of his word. Being spiritual includes honesty, gentleness, patience, joy, civility, simple living, mercy, compassion, peace, reverence and awe, obedience, justice, courage, balance in life, humility, chastity, kindness, generosity, lightheartedness, care for the common good, prayerfulness, and respect for all of creation as holv.

Spirituality is about absorbing the lifestyle of Jesus, about his word echoing in our lives, something that takes a lifetime. Religion, specifically our Catholic faith, is the practice of that spirituality in the company of others who

are also trying to put those values into practice. Such practice, including weekly Mass and participation in the sacramental life of the Church, is necessary for the faithful followers of lesus.

MARCH FOR LIFE

The 2025 March for Life on May 8th began at 10:45 am with the recitation of the Holy Rosary at Holy Rosary Cathedral. This was followed by the Holy Mass, celebrated by Father Gregory Roth of the Saskatoon Diocese and was concelebrated by Father Warren Dungan. The crowd on the walk to the Legislative Building seemed a bit smaller, but grew nicely to a good sized crowd, thanks in part to the students from the Regina Christian School who showed up. Free hotdogs, refreshments and cookies were provided by Victory Church for the second year in a row and were greatly appreciated by all in attendance. The event was marred by a very small and extremely loud group of protesters, who, lacking any sense of respect, played loud music and yelled as the guest speakers were giving their talks. Wayne Ottenbreit was awarded the Dombowsky Memorial Award and various people gave short addresses including Elaine Webster from Silent No More gave a heart moving talk about her journey from pro-abortion to pro-life. At one point, security called in the police but they didn't do anything to stop the harassment of the protesters. The pro-life crowd rose to the challenge and simply used signs and flags to block the protesters. A job well done by Saskatchewan Pro Life to carry on with the celebration at the Legislative Building under such difficult circumstances.
